Traditional Medicine

Despite the remarkable progress in medical technology and drug industry, some people still do not like going to hospitals for treatment. In the past decade, there has been renewed attention and interest in the use of traditional medicine (TM) globally. Natural products and traditional medicine have been used for centuries in many parts of the world. Some traditional medicine, like Chinese medicine, Ayurveda in India, Kampo in Japan, and Korean medicine, have become well-established systems of healthcare. However, is traditional medicine a good thing?

Supporters of traditional medicine would argue that its history has had a deep impact on human health for centuries. Traditional medicine originated in China around 3000 years ago and spread to Korea and Japan with the influence of Chinese culture starting in the 6th century. In China, Western medicine made its initial appearance in the 16th century, but it did not gain widespread popularity until the 19th century. Before that, Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) was the primary healthcare system. TCM has developed specific techniques for things like the right amount to use, how to prepare and process materials, and the best time to collect plant parts for medicine. It is interesting that TCM is becoming more similar to modern medicine. It accounts for around 40% of all health care delivered .

Moreover, it has been claimed that traditional medicine doctors are not different from any medical school doctors. For example, in China, Korea, and Japan, TM doctors are defined by law, and their activities are controlled by the government. A five-year course in TM is a must in China's universities while in Korea is a six-year program offered by eleven private universities. In medical facilities like hospitals and clinics, Korea had the highest percentage of traditional medicine (TM) doctors at 15.26%, followed by China at 12.63%. In the case of Japan, the new law of medicine forces students to study TM after studying modern medicine first which makes it harder for students to go for another five years studying TM course. As a result, only 0.65% of doctors, who are also members of a non-governmental academic society called the Japan Society for Oriental Medicine, practiced Kampo in 2008.

On the other hand, critics of traditional medicine claim that like any other medicine, TM also has some side effects. Herbal medicine can cause kidney failure and liver damage in some cases because they contain toxic chemicals. In 1999, a 34-year-old Australian woman was found dead in her house for drinking herbal tea to lose weight. After investigation, it was found that her herbal tea contained an excessive level of lead, which caused severe poisoning and led to death.

Besides, many herbal products did not have any warning labels about ingredients, side effects, and drug interactions. Therefore, Australia has issued a new rule to prevent selling any herbal products without warning labels.

So is traditional medicine better or not? Perhaps it all depends on how the individual manages the medicine itself. It is undoubtful that TM has many benefits but we cannot ignore the need for modern medicine and its theories.

The Fascinating World of Boobies Birds

1-Boobies are fascinating seabirds with unique characters and behaviours like those in forests and grasslands. They have an attractive appearance, can dive deep under water, and have interesting breeding habits. These birds are popular among birdwatchers and scientists. They are large, strong birds with long wings and powerful bodies. They have a wingspan of two meters and weight up to seven kilogrammes.

2- There are several species of boobies, but the most well-known are the Blue-footed Booby, the Red-footed Booby, and the Nazca Booby. These seabirds are primarily found in the Galápagos Islands and the coasts of Central and South America. One of the main features of boobies is their brightly coloured feet, which vary among species. 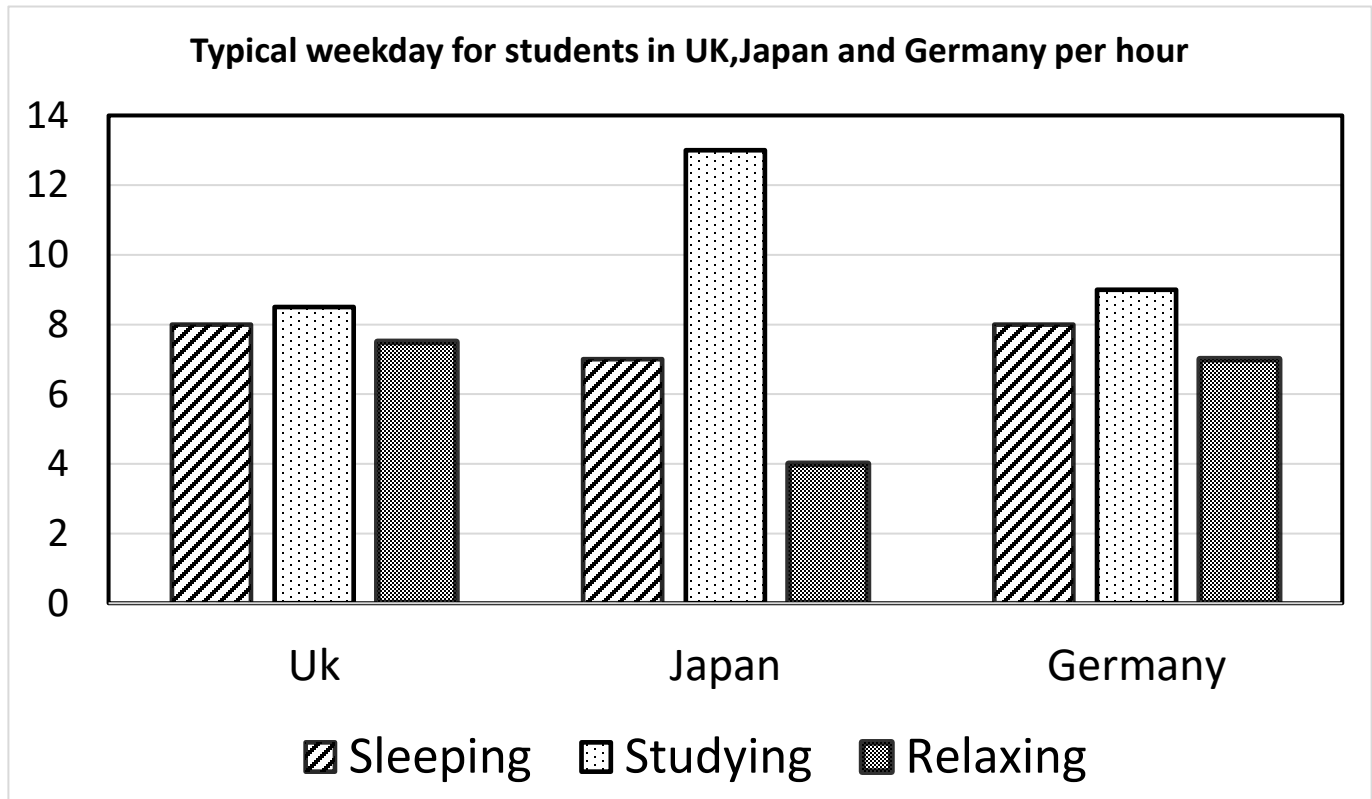

Today, over half of the total paper used by people is collected and recycled. Paper is considered to be the major component of solid waste and makes up 50% of the garbage in landfills. Paper recycling means turning used paper into new paper products without harming trees or forests. It's an eco-friendly process that uses less energy, produces less pollution, and reduces the demand for raw materials compared to making paper from scratch. Clean paper can be recycled, but items like paper towels and napkins should be composted for natural decomposition since they are not recyclable. However, is Paper Recycling Worth It?

Recycling is an essential method to minimize waste accumulation and reduce pollution. Germany has been celebrated as a world leader in recycling paper. Based on data from the CEPI (Confederation of European Paper Industries) Germany had the highest percentage of recycling paper at 75%, followed by Sweden at 73.1% then Norway at 70.2%. In the case of Germany, about 75% of the raw materials used by the German paper industry come from wastepaper. Recycling paper reduces the energy and materials needed to produce a ton of office paper, resulting in a decrease of 4.3 tons of CO2 emissions.

Moreover, preventing waste and recycling are important for reducing the need to use new resources from forests, oil, and mines. This saves energy in making and transporting products, leading to less carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gas emissions. Simply put, every time you recycle or reuse, you help cut down on greenhouse gases and protect the climate. Also, recycling not only reduces the amount of waste sent to landfills but also helps minimize the generation of methane. Methane is a dangerous gas that trapped heat and leading to global warming. By recycling paper, we can prevent methane generation.

Although, recycling paper has many advantages, still many people do not like the whole process of it. In 2022, a study of measuring the awareness of recycling importance by an environmental agency in Ohio, showed that 13% of Americans do not recycle at all. This is because they got confused about what should and should not be recycled. America had adopted a new method to encourage people to recycle but unfortunately, it was not easy for some people. It started an 'Energiewende,' aiming for cleaner energy, and worked to highlight the importance of eco-friendly waste management to the public. Sadly, it is very expensive way and made many people pay lots of money to be part of that program.

Similar to USA, Germany made a rule that says all packaging must have a green dot if it can be recycled. Companies pay a fee to get this label. This rule is now used in many European countries and has helped recycle over 460 billion packages. The main problem for this strategy is the time consuming.

Overall, recycling paper is a good way to protect the environment and keeps the Earth clean. However, it likely costs more economically.

Their most distinctive feature is their pink color which comes from eating shrimp and algae. They are found in parts of Africa, America, Asia, and Europe. There are six types of flamingos. The Chilean, Andean, and puna flamingos are found in South America. The greater and lesser flamingos live in Africa and some parts of the Middle East. The American or Caribbean flamingo is native to Mexico and the Caribbean.

2. Flamingos are social birds that live in groups near water. They are very famous for being good dancers. They twist and march in unison with a wing in one direction and a leg in another. This is their way to find a partner. Every year, thousands of flamingos **migrate** in Camargue, France. They're gathering to choose a mate. Each flamingo is looking for a partner that's just as good a dancer as they are. Scientists discovered that about nine moves of dance these birds have.

3. The American flamingo is one of the largest species of flamingo. An average adult is 1.5 meters tall and weighs 1.8-3.6 kilograms. They use their unique beaks to **filter** algae and small fish from the water for their main food.

4. Breeding habits among flamingo are influenced significantly by rainfall. Rainfall is like a signal for them, telling them when it's a good time to start the breeding process. So, if there's been a lot of rain, it is the right time for them to start building nests and having chicks. They start having babies when they're around 3 to 6 years old, but only if they're fully grown and colorful. To make baby flamingos successfully, they need big groups—like at least 50 or even better, hundreds or thousands. Nesting is important for these birds. They dig in a mud to make a small hole. Both female and male help in building the nest. The female lays a single egg. The couple takes turns keeping the egg warm for 27-31 days, and usually, they have just one set of chicks each year.

5. Flamingos are important symbols in different cultures, often representing beauty, balance, and grace. They also stand for community and teamwork because of how they live and work together. In these cultures, people see flamingos as a reminder that when individuals come together and cooperate, it creates harmony and a better community. For example, Greeks associated flamingos with life, death, rebirth, and transformation while Egyptians believed flamingos were linked to the beauty of the world.

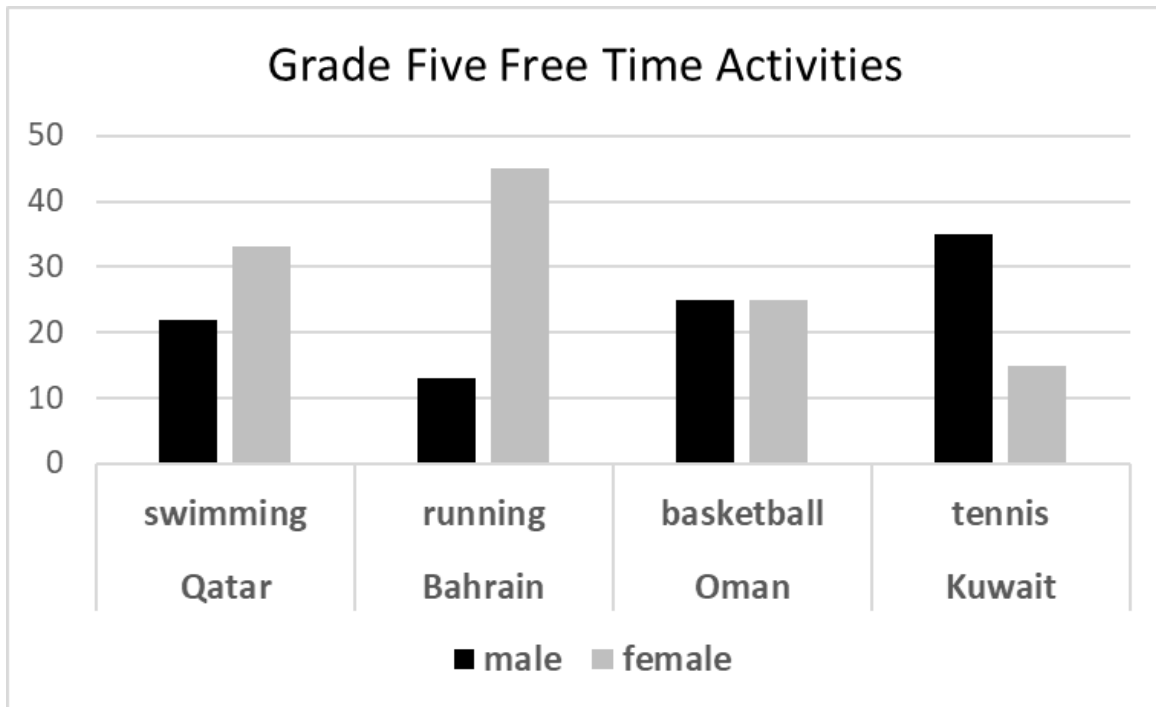

Celebrities are everywhere nowadays: on TV, in magazines, online. Is this preoccupation with famous people harmless fun or is it bad for us? How many people are truly obsessed with modern media idols? And on the other side of the coin, can fame be harmful to the celebrities?

Studies suggest that the vast majority of teenagers do not really worship celebrities. Researchers have identified three kinds of fans. About 15% of young people have an 'entertainment-social' interest. They love chatting about their favourite celebrities with friends and this does not appear to do any harm.

Another 5% feel that they have an 'intense-personal' relationship with a celebrity. Sometimes they see them as their soulmate and find that they are often thinking about them, even when they don't want to. These people are more at risk from depression and anxiety. If girls in this group idolise a female star with a body they consider to be perfect, they are more likely to be unhappy with their own bodies.

That leaves 2% of young people with a 'borderline-pathological' interest. They might say, for example, they would spend several thousand pounds on a paper plate the celebrity had used, or that they would do something illegal if the celebrity asked them to. These people are in most danger of being seriously disturbed.

What about the celebrities themselves? A study in the USA tried to measure narcissism or extreme self-centeredness, when feelings of worthlessness and invisibility are compensated for by turning into the opposite: excessive showing off. Researchers looked at 200 celebrities, 200 young adults with Masters in Business Administration (a group known for being narcissistic) and a nationally representative sample using the same questionnaire. As was expected, the celebrities were significantly more narcissistic than the MBAs and both groups were a lot more narcissistic than the general population.

Four kinds of celebrity were included in the sample. The most narcissistic were the ones who had become famous through reality TV shows – they scored highest on vanity and willingness to exploit other people. Next came comedians, who scored highest on exhibitionism and feelings of superiority. Then came actors, and the least narcissistic were musicians. One interesting result was that there was no connection between narcissism and the length of time the celebrity had been famous. This means that becoming famous probably did not make the celebrities narcissistic – they already were beforehand.

So, what can we learn from this? People who are very successful or famous tend to be narcissists and are liable to be ruthless, self-seeking workaholics. As we can see from celebrity magazines, they are also often desperate and lonely. They make disastrous role models.

In the various stages of the prize programme, the Omani innovator was able to overcome several challenges and won the votes of the programme jury several times, to be able to progress through the stages and reach the final stage. Sumaya's entry into the final was also the first time that a woman scientist from GCC had reached that level. Sumaya bagged the first place with a total of 82.3 points, while the Jordanian Nouredin Al-Diri came in second with 38.9 points and the Libyan Shatha bin Nabih came in third with 33.8 points, according to the Oman News Agency (ONA). The top prize for Sumaya was US\$300,000 to implement her project.

Speaking to the ONA, Sumaya said: "This coronation came as a result of the great support of various government and private institutions and members of the Omani society and from the Gulf and Arab countries through voting. I thank them all and I am happy that I was able to prove the importance of scientific innovation and its role in preserving the environment and the health of the human being."

Sumaya hoped that her project would be implemented at the local and global levels to benefit from it and will open new horizons for environmental protection. She called for support for her project by all concerned authorities in the Sultanate of Oman. Sumaya had worked for the past two years on this project at the Sultan Qaboos University. The scientific innovation of Sumaya offers a promising solution to eliminate and dispose of micro plastics in a safe and environmentally friendly manner using microbial confinement and a nano-ZnO catalyst.

Stars of Science is one of the leading programs in the Arab world and focuses on innovation to support and encourage aspiring entrepreneurs in the field of science and technology in the region. The idea is to allow the evaluation and development of innovations by progressing through several competitive rounds to qualify for the final qualification stage of the program.

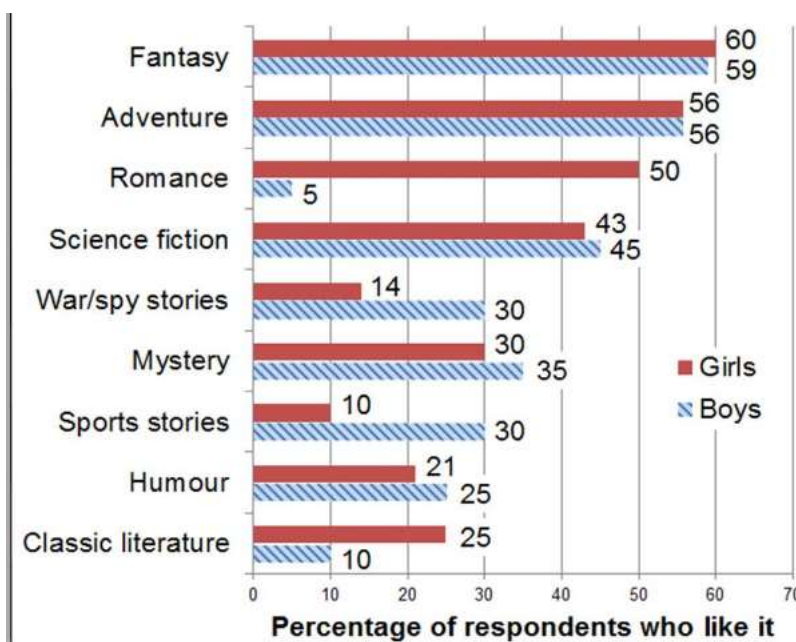

Making a change How easy is it for us to change our lives and why?

In 1990, a young American named Christopher McCandless gave up his career plans, left behind everyone he knew, including his family, and went off on an adventure. He was 22 at the time. In an act of kindness, he donated all his savings to the famous charity, Oxfam International, and hitchhiked his way through America to Alaska. His decisions were so unusual for his age that Jon Krakauer wrote a book about them called ***Into the Wild***, and Sean Penn directed a film that had the same title.

Of course, this is an unusual story. Most college graduates would not do quite the same thing. However, studies do show that in teenage years, people are more likely to try out new experiences. Instead of following the family career path, for example, and working his way up the same organization like his grandfather did, a 15-year-old may dream about becoming a traveler - only to find in his early 20s that this fascination with new places is declining and change is less attractive. This age-related trend can be observed in all cultures.

The reason why people all over the world become less keen to change as they get older may be because people's lives generally follow similar patterns and involve similar demands. Most people, wherever they are, aim to find a job and a partner. As they get older, they may have young children to look after and possibly elderly family members. These responsibilities cannot be achieved without some degree of consistency, which means that new experiences and ideas may not have a place in the person's life. New experiences may bring excitement but also insecurity, and so most people prefer to stay with their parents.

However, not every individual is the same. One toddler may want to play a different game every day and get fed up if nothing changes at the nursery. Another may seek out and play with the same children and toys on every visit. Young children who avoid new experiences will grow up to be more conventional than others. Psychologists argue that those who have more open personalities as children are more open than others might be when they are older. They also suggest that young men have a greater interest in novelty than women, although, as they age, this desire for new experiences fades more quickly than it does in women.

The truth is that, as we get older, we prefer the things we know. We tend to order the same meals in restaurants, sit on the same side of the train when we commute to work, go on holiday to the same places and construct our day in the same way. If you are older than 20, remember that your openness to new experiences is slowly declining.

So you are better off making a new start today than postponing it until later.

Social media, magazines and shop windows bombard people daily with things to buy, and British consumers are buying more clothes and shoes than ever before. Online shopping means it is easy for customers to buy without thinking, while major brands offer such cheap clothes that they can be treated like one-use items – worn two or three times and then thrown away.

In Britain, the average person spends more than £1,000 on new clothes a year, which is around four per cent of their income. That might not sound like much, but that figure hides two far more worrying trends for society and for the environment. First, a lot of that consumer spending is via credit cards. British people currently owe approximately £670 per adult to credit card companies. That's 66 per cent of the average wardrobe budget. Also, not only are people spending money they don't have, they're using it to buy things they don't need. Britain throws away 300,000 tons of clothing a year, most of which goes into landfill sites.

People might not realise they are part of the disposable clothing problem because they donate their unwanted clothes to charities. But charity shops can't sell all those unwanted clothes. 'Fast fashion' goes out of fashion as quickly as it came in and is often too poor quality to recycle; people don't want to buy it second-hand. Huge quantities end up being thrown away, and a lot of clothes that charities can't sell are sent abroad, causing even more economic and environmental problems.

However, a different trend is springing up in opposition to consumerism – the 'buy nothing' trend. The idea originated in Canada in the early 1990s and then moved to the US, where it became a rejection of the overspending and overconsumption of Black Friday and Cyber Monday during Thanksgiving weekend. On Buy Nothing Day people organise various types of complaints and cut up their credit cards. Throughout the year, Buy Nothing groups organise the exchange and repair of items they already own.

The trend has now reached influencers on social media who usually share posts of clothing and make-up that they recommend for people to buy. Some YouTube stars now encourage their viewers not to buy anything at all for periods as long as a year. Two friends in Canada spent a year working towards buying only food. For the first three months they learned how to live without buying electrical goods, clothes or things for the house. For the next stage, they gave up services, for example haircuts, eating out at restaurants or buying petrol for their cars. In one year, they'd saved \$55,000.

The changes they made meant two fewer cars on the roads, a reduction in plastic and paper packaging and a positive impact on the environment from all the energy saved. If everyone followed a similar plan, the results would be impressive. But even if you can't manage a full year without going shopping, you can participate in the anti-consumerist movement by refusing to buy things you don't need. Buy Nothing groups send a clear message to companies that people are no longer willing to accept the environmental and human cost of overconsumption.

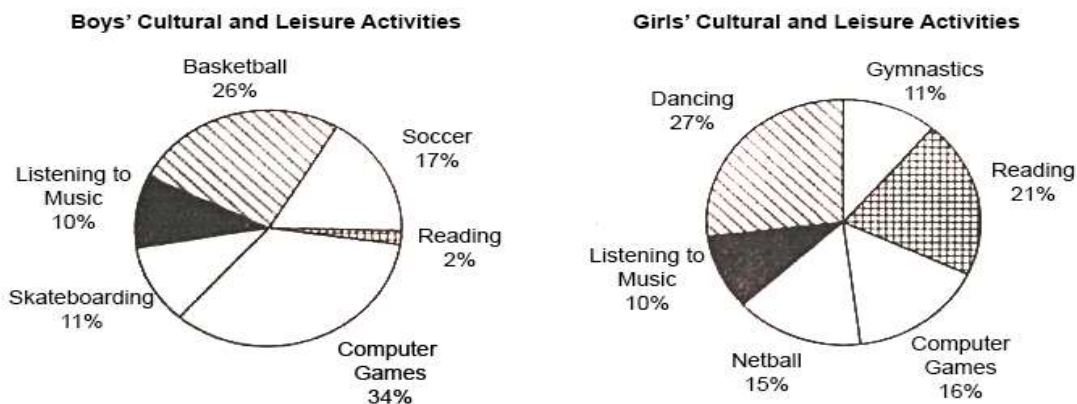

Video games are perhaps the most popular and widespread form of entertainment at present. Companies that develop video games earn billions of dollars and constantly invest in research aimed to make virtual reality look like reality. Their products become more and more sophisticated, and they attract a wide audience. However, despite all the joy that video games can bring to children and teenagers, who are the main target audiences of game developing companies, actively engaging in video games at such a young age can produce adverse effects.

The harm of video games causes many negative effects. They can have effects on physical health. Though the fans of video gaming claim that such games increase concentration, and muscle coordination. In reality, teenagers who spend a huge amount of time playing games experience effects that are not so beneficial.

There is a possibility of the loss of sight. Spending hours on a computer or in front of a TV is one of the main causes of blurred vision among youth. In addition, sacrificing healthy physical activities in favor of video gaming may become a risk factor for obesity. Gamers often do not want to interrupt their playing for meals. They eat right in front of the monitor, and their rations often consist of products that can be easily cooked or eaten immediately, such as crisps, chocolate bars and fast foods. All of this definitely does not contribute to the proper and healthy development of a young, growing body.

Individuals who spend excessive hours playing video games may lack the capability to distinguish between reality from fantasy. Video games often offer simplified and conditional models of environments, relationships, friendships, and rivalries. Gamers use these models to learn to interact with the world around them, and they often lack skills that would be developed by real-life experience instead of the simulation. Therefore, it can be implied that another negative effect caused by video games is the inability of social adaptation on the part of the gamers.

It can be concluded that video games are a form of entertainment which is not suitable for children and teenagers. This assessment is based on a number of negative consequences that excessive video gaming causes. Young people who spend an inexplicable sum of hours playing video games are observed to be prone to sight loss and obesity. In addition, they tend to be more aggressive than their peers who do not play video games, and they experience difficulties with social adaptation. Also, video games can lead to addictions that are no less serious than alcoholism or drugs, as evidenced in recent media stories reporting on deaths among inveterate video gamers. This collection of facts contributes to the negative evaluation of video games as an unwholesome activity for children and teenagers.

Thanks to the field of linguistics, we know much about the development of the 5,000 plus languages in existence today. We can describe their grammar and pronunciation and see how their spoken and written forms have changed over time. Experts are beginning to look to the field of evolutionary biology to find out how the human developed to be able to use language.

We know that human language is far more complex than that of even the most intelligent animals like chimpanzees. We can express complex thoughts, convey subtle emotions and communicate about abstract concepts. And we do this following a set of structural rules, known as grammar. Do only humans use an innate system of rules to govern the order of words? Perhaps not, as some research may suggest dolphins share this capability because they are able to recognize when these rules are broken.

If we want to know where our capability for complex language came from, we need to look at how our brains are different from other animals. This relates to more than just brain size; it is important what other things our brains can do and when and why they evolved that way. One thing we can see in the remains of early humans, however, is the development of the mouth, throat and tongue. By about 100,000 years ago, humans had **evolved** the ability to create complex sounds. Before that, evolutionary biologists can only guess whether or not early humans communicated using basic sounds.

Another question is, what is it about human brains that allowed language to evolve in a way that it did not in other **primates**? At some point, our brains became able to make our mouths produce vowel and consonant sounds, and we developed the capacity to invent words to name things around us. These were the basic ingredients for complex language. The next change would have been to put those words into sentences. Brains didn't suddenly get bigger, yet humans did become more complex and more intelligent. Was it using language that caused their brains to develop? Or did their more complex brains start producing language?

More questions lie in looking at the influence of genetics on brain and language development. Are there genes that mutated and gave us language ability? Researchers have found a gene mutation that occurred between 200,000 and 100,000 years ago, which seems to have a connection with speaking and how our brains control our mouths and face.

It's too early to say how much influence genes have on language, but one day the answers might be found in our DNA.
